4.1 Overview

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4.2 About Micro GC Fusion

Micro GC Fusion is an analytical instrument that can accommodate multiple gas chromatograph (GC) modules, each performing GC analysis with individually optimized chromatographic conditions. The sample is introduced through the front sample inlet to optimize detection and separation on the GC modules using appropriate carrier gases.

A GC module is a self-contained miniature gas chromatograph that consists of:

- a sample injector using Microelectromechanical Systems (MEMS) technology
- a resistively-heated, temperature programmable capillary column
- · an electronic pressure control system
- a MEMS-based micro thermal conductivity detector (µTCD)

Chromatography software included with Micro GC Fusion may be operated from the instrument front panel display, or by a networked computer. Both the analytical method and the resulting data files are stored on the Micro GC Fusion hard drive.

Micro GC Fusion has a heated inlet which is hot to the touch.



A CAUTION

Micro GC Fusion air pathways must remain unobstructed to allow cooling of the analytical column(s) following a temperature programmed method run. Allow a minimum of 6.5 cm (2.5 in.) clearance to the top, the front, the back, and both sides of the instrument to provide unrestricted air flow to the instrument.

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⚠ CAUTION

Ensure the Micro GC Fusion fan exhaust at the back of the instrument is not blocked and the air flow through the bottom of Micro GC Fusion is unobstructed.



⚠ CAUTION

Carrier gas inlet (rear of instrument) pressure must be between 400-427 kPa (58-62 psi). Use a dual-stage regulator on the carrier gas cylinder to ensure the pressure range is maintained.

Exceeding 565 kPa (82 psi) may damage Micro GC Fusion and require factory repair.



⚠ CAUTION

Sample inlet gas pressure must be less than 172 kPa (25 psi). Exceeding 172 kPa (25 psi) will damage Micro GC Fusion and require factory repair.



A CAUTION

When the Integrated Sample Conditioner is installed, a pressurized sample of up to 6,895 kPa (1,000 psi) can be connected to the Micro GC Fusion inlet. Exercise caution when handling the high pressure samples.



↑ CAUTION

Micro GC Fusion is ventilated using an internal fan. The air inlet on the front of Micro GC Fusion must be kept clean and unobstructed. Allow a minimum of 6.5 cm (2.5 in.) clearance in front of the instrument to allow for proper ventilation.



⚠ WARNING

Safely vent carrier and sample streams - potentially toxic, noxious, asphyxiant (oxygen displacing) or flammable gases - outside Micro GC Fusion and away from the operating area. Vent toxic gases to a fume hood, chemical trap, or reaction medium.



4.5 Theory of Operation

Gas chromatography is used to separate and analyze compounds in mixed gas samples. A typical GC module consists of four main subsystems: injection, separation, detection, and data system.



4.5.1 Injection

A sample is introduced into a GC system through its injector. Micro GC Fusion accepts gas phase samples only at pressures ranging 0-172 kPa (0-25 psi). Micro GC Fusion is equipped with a sample inlet system that distributes injected sample to each injector on multiple GC modules within the instrument for simultaneous analysis.



A CAUTION

Micro GC Fusion is intended for gas sampling only. Liquid injections will damage the instrument.

The optional External Sample Conditioner is recommended when the sample gas is at high pressure - up to 5516 kPa (800 psi). The External Sample Conditioner reduces the sample gas pressure to approximately 0-172 kPa (0-25 psi) and heats the sample to a constant temperature to optimize analysis repeatability.


Carrier gas, also known as the mobile phase, carries the injected sample into the column for analysis. A high purity inert gas, free from hydrocarbons, oxygen and moisture is required. Helium is preferred, while hydrogen, nitrogen, and argon are viable options depending on application requirements.

Carrier gas with a purity of 99.999% is preferred. A purity of 99.995% is acceptable when a carrier gas trap is installed.

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4.5.2 Separation


Component separation of a sample injected onto a column is achieved through the interaction between the sample and the column coating, also known as the stationary phase. The less retentive the column coating is to a specific compound, the faster that compound travels, or elutes, through the column. Order of elution is primarily determined by the compound boiling point and polarity.



Micro GC Fusion uses high performance fused silica capillary columns to perform GC separation. Two types of capillary columns are used:

- Porous Layer Open Tubular (PLOT)
 PLOT columns have small particles coated on the inner surface of the column and separation is based on gas-solid partitioning. Common PLOT columns are Molsieve, Q-Bond, U-Bond, and Alumina. PLOT columns separate based on compound polarity.
- Wall Coated Open Tubular (WCOT)

WCOT columns have a liquid stationary phase based on gas-liquid partitioning. The dimethylpolysiloxane (PDMS) column is a commonly used WCOT column, which primarily separates compounds based on boiling point.



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The capillary column installed in Micro GC Fusion is resistively heated to achieve temperature ramping, which quickly increases the column temperature to reduce analysis time and improve compound separation.

Separation may be optimized by:

- · selecting the appropriate column coating type and thickness
- · selecting the appropriate column length and diameter
- · selecting the appropriate carrier gas type
- adjusting the column head pressure
- · adjusting the column temperature programming profile


4.5.3 Detection

The separated sample elutes from the GC column and enters the detection subsystem, where and electrical signal is generated based on compound type and concentration.

Micro GC Fusion MEMS based μ TCD provides excellent sensitivity. A detection limit of 1 ppm can be achieved for some compounds when the analysis method is optimized. The μ TCD detects the difference in thermal conductivity of the gas traveling through the reference side (pure carrier gas) versus the gas traveling through the analytical side (carrier gas plus the sample gas).



μTCD sensitivity is matrix, carrier gas, and component dependent.



4.5.4 Data System


A data system controls the GC and processes the detector signal output for the sample being analyzed. GC operation parameters such as the sample injection time, column pressure and column temperature programming profile are defined in a method. Once a method is loaded on Micro GC Fusion, a sample run can be initiated. As compounds elute from the GC column and are detected, a chromatogram is

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displayed with the detector response on the y axis and retention time of the separated compound on the x axis. The chromatogram provides qualitative and quantitative information about the injected sample.

Component identity is determined by its retention time in a GC analysis. Retention time measures the time interval between injection and the detection of a component. The less retentive the column coating is to a specific compound, the faster that compound will travel, resulting in shorter retention times. Components that are more retentive to the column will travel slower, resulting in longer retention times. A calibration standard with compounds at known concentrations is necessary to determine the retention times of the target compounds. Using the same analytical conditions, an unknown sample is then injected into the GC to determine its composition based on the pre-determined peak retention time.

Quantitation of the target compounds in a GC analysis can be obtained by measuring the corresponding peak area presented in a chromatogram. The peak area is proportional to the analyte concentration detected and can be obtained by integrating the peak. The target compound concentration may be obtained by creating a calibration curve using calibration gases. Micro GC Fusion uses peak area to quantify target compound concentration.



Micro GC Fusion embedded chromatography software controls the GC and performs data analysis. Operation may be controlled directly from the front panel display. A web-based user interface can be accessed by computers connected through Ethernet or Wi-Fi on commercially available web browsers.

Micro GC Fusion can also be controlled using INFICON EZ IQ or Agilent CDS OpenLab EZChrom software. See EZ IQ or OpenLab EZChrom Instrument Control [268] for details.

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5 Product Overview

Micro GC Fusion is available in two chassis configurations:

- · 2-module chassis, which can house one or two GC modules
- · 4-module chassis, which can house three or four GC modules

The two chassis configurations share most of the hardware components. The following overview is applicable to both chassis configurations unless otherwise specified.

5.1 2-Module Chassis

The 2-module Micro GC Fusion chassis houses up to two analytical GC modules, electrical components and internal plumbing. The front panel display provides access to basic operating interfaces and controls.

- · Heated sample inlet
 - 1/16 in. Swagelok® male connector. A 1/8 in. Quick Connect is provided if the optional Integrated Sample Conditioner is installed.
- · Front panel display
 - See Front Panel Operation [▶ 168] for details about using the front panel display to access routine operating controls.
- · On/Standby button
 - Illuminated On/Standby button to power on or place the instrument in standby mode.



Electrical and gas connections are located on the Micro GC Fusion back panel.

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5.2 4-Module Chassis

The 4-module Micro GC Fusion chassis houses up to four analytical GC modules, electrical components and internal plumbing. The front panel display provides access to basic operating interfaces and controls.

- · Heated sample inlet
 - The inlet is a 1/16 in. Swagelok[®] male connector. A 1/8 in. quick connect is provided if the optional integrated sample conditioner is installed.
- · Front panel display
 - See Front Panel Operation [▶ 168] for details about using the front panel display to access routine operating controls.
- · On/Standby button
 - Use the illuminated On/Standby button to power on or place the instrument in standby mode.



Electrical and gas connections are located on the Micro GC Fusion back panel.

An optional rack mounting kit (PN 952-4100-G1) is available which allows the 4-module chassis to be mounted on a 19 in. rack mount. See Installing the Rack Mount Kit [\triangleright 75].

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5.3 Sample Inlets

Sample gas is introduced to Micro GC Fusion through a front sample inlet.

Sample input pressure may range 0-172 kPa (0-25 psi), or up to 6,895 kPa (1,000 psi) when an optional Integrated Sample Conditioner is used.

5.3.1 Front Sample Inlet

The standard inlet is a 1/16 in. Swagelok male connector. It connects the sample to one or more GC modules inside Micro GC Fusion, allowing for parallel analysis on multiple GC modules.

The front sample inlet is heated and deactivated to avoid sample condensation and adsorption. Inlet temperature can be set in the method, which may range 30-140°C (86-284°F).



⚠ WARNING

Micro GC Fusion has a heated inlet which is hot to the touch.



A CAUTION

Sample inlet gas pressure must be less than 172 kPa (25 psi). Exceeding 172 kPa (25 psi) will damage Micro GC Fusion and require factory repair.

When the optional Integrated Sample Conditioner is installed, the front sample inlet is a 1/8 in. Quick Connect. The 1/8 in. Quick Connect will be heated as part of the Integrated Sample Conditioner.



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5.4 Carrier Gas Connections

Micro GC Fusion supports up to two external carrier gas connections from pressurized tanks for the 2-module chassis, and up to four external carrier gas connections for the 4-module chassis. Common carrier gases include: helium, hydrogen, argon, and nitrogen. The selection of carrier gases is dependent on the analytical compounds, sample matrix, and concentration.

Two 1/8 in. Swagelok carrier gas connectors are located on the back panel of the 2-module chassis. Four 1/8 in. Swagelok carrier gas connectors are located on the back panel of the 4-module chassis.

- When one carrier gas connector is configured, it supports the operation of all GC modules
- When two carrier gas connectors are configured on the 2-module chassis, one will support GC module A and the other will support GC module B
- For the 4-module chassis, the carrier gas connector can be configured with:
 - One carrier gas connector for Modules A and B, one carrier gas connector for Modules C and D. In this configuration, one carrier gas is shared by Modules A and B. The other is shared by modules C and D.
 - Two carrier gas connectors for Modules A and B, two carrier gas connectors for Modules C and D. In this configuration, each module is configured with its own carrier gas connector, allowing up to four carrier gas connections.



Use high purity carrier gas (99.999%) with an input pressure range of 400-427 kPa (58-62 psi).

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⚠ CAUTION

Carrier gas inlet (rear of instrument) pressure must be between 400-427 kPa (58-62 psi). Use a dual-stage regulator on the carrier gas cylinder to ensure the pressure range is maintained.

Exceeding 565 kPa (82 psi) may damage Micro GC Fusion and require factory repair.

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5.5 Venting Connections


Four types of venting connections are located on the back panel:

- ANALYTICAL
- REFERENCE
- PUMP
- HIGH PRESSURE PURGE VENT

ANALYTICAL, **REFERENCE**, and **PUMP** vents require 1/8 in. Swagelok connectors. The **HIGH PRESSURE PURGE VENT**, available only when the Integrated Sample Conditioner is installed, requires a 1/8 in. Swagelok connector.



Micro GC Fusion instruments shipped before October 2019 may have Luer Lock connectors for the ANALYTICAL, REFERENCE, and PUMP vents.



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5.5.1 ANALYTICAL Vent

The **ANALYTICAL** vents are used to vent the exhaust from the GC module analytical columns.

5.5.2 REFERENCE Vent

The **REFERENCE** vents are used to vent the exhaust from the GC module reference columns.

553 PUMP Vent

The **PUMP** vent is used to vent the exhaust from the purge of the inlet and injection assembly. In Backflush mode, the PUMP vent is also used to vent the backflushed sample exhaust from the pre-column.

5.5.4 HIGH PRESSURE PURGE Vent

When the Integrated Sample Conditioner is installed, the **HIGH PRESSURE PURGE VENT** will require a 1/8 in. Swagelok connector. The high pressure sample will be regulated down to about 345 kPa (50 psi) by the Integrated Sample Conditioner and then vented through the High Pressure Purge Vent connector.



⚠ WARNING

Gas pressure on the HIGH PRESSURE PURGE VENT may be up to 448 kPa (65 psi). Extreme caution must be taken to vent the high pressure sample to avoid personal injury.

5.6 Front Panel Display

The front panel display is used to load a stored method/sequence, run the loaded method/sequence, view run data, and view system status.

For more details, see Front Panel Operation [168].



Complex operations such as method or sequence development require a separate computer with a larger display screen.



5.7 GC Module

A GC module is a self-contained gas chromatograph that can perform sample injection, separation, and detection. Up to two GC modules can be installed in a 2-module chassis or up to four GC modules can be installed in a 4-module chassis, each optimized to analyze different compounds from the same sample source.



5.7.1 Injection

A gas sample is injected into Micro GC Fusion through the front and is directed to one or more GC modules simultaneously. The MEMS injector on the GC module contains a sample loop and micro-diaphragm valves which are used to direct the sample and carrier gas flows. The sample volume is determined by the **Inject (ms)** time setting in the method. The injector temperature is also set in the method and can range from 30-100°C (86-212°F).

Micro GC Fusion supports four types of injectors:

- · Variable Volume
- · Variable Large Volume
- · Fixed Volume
- · Backflush, Fixed and Timed

5.7.1.1 Variable Volume Injector

Valid **Inject (ms)** time set points for the Variable Volume injector range from 10 to 100 ms. A typical set point is 25 ms. An **Inject (ms)** time of 0 ms results in no injection.

- Values less than 10 ms may result in poor repeatability
- Longer injection times allow larger volumes of sample to be injected, which results in higher sensitivity on a μTCD.



The Variable Volume Injector may be influenced by matrix effect as the sample density varies with compositional changes.

5.7.1.2 Variable Large Volume Injector

The Variable Large Volume Injector (LVI) should only be used when lower detection limits (1-10 ppm) are required.

Valid **Inject (ms)** time set points for the Variable Large Volume Injector range from 10 to 450 ms. A typical set point is 100 ms. An **Inject (ms)** time of 0 ms results in no injection.

- · Values less than 10 ms may result in poor repeatability
- Longer injection times allow larger volumes of sample to be injected, which results in higher sensitivity on the μTCD



The Variable Large Volume Injector may be influenced by matrix effect as sample density varies with compositional changes.

5.7.1.3 Fixed Volume Injector

The Fixed Volume Injector provides the best accuracy and precision for concentrations above 200 ppm. It minimizes matrix effects as sample density varies with compositional changes.

Valid **Inject (ms)** time set points for the Fixed Volume Injector range from 0 to 50 ms. A typical set point is 30 ms. An **Inject (ms)** time of 0 ms results in no injection.

· Values less than 15 ms may result in poor repeatability

5.7.1.4 Backflush Injector

The backflush assembly consists of:

- · a backflush injector
- · a pre-column
- · an analytical column

The pre-column is a short section of column connected in series to the analytical column. The pre-column prevents contaminants from entering the analytical column.

After the sample enters the analytical column, the flow is reversed (backflushed) through the pre-column, flushing undesired components from the pre-column to vent. Backflushing the pre-column prevents strongly retained compounds from entering the analytical column and causing ghost peaks on subsequent runs.

The Backflush Injector has two method parameters: **Backflush Time** (in seconds) and **Inject (ms)** time (in milliseconds).

Valid **Backflush Time** set points range from 0 to 250 s.

Valid Inject (ms) time set points range from 0 to 250 ms.

The **Backflush Injector** can function in a semi-fixed mode. An **Inject (ms)** time of 0 ms will result in a fixed injection volume. This is best used for component concentrations above 0.1%, and will result in higher precision.

For component concentrations below 0.1%, the backflush injector can be operated as a variable volume injector. An **Inject (ms)** time greater than 10 ms will allow larger sample volumes to be injected, which in turn results in higher sensitivity on a μ TCD.

Backflush times vary with column types, lengths, head pressure and temperature set points. Backflush times should be optimized for each GC module.

5.7.2 Separation

Depending on the GC column used, separation is primarily based on the component boiling point or polarity. The table below contains a list of common components that can be separated on various GC column types.



- · column temperature
- · column head pressure


Temperature ramping provides additional control of component separation, compared to isothermal operation. With temperature programming, light components can be separated at low column temperatures. The column temperature can then be ramped to increase the elution speed of heavier components.

5.7.3 Detection

Micro GC Fusion uses a MEMS based μTCD and has a detection range from low ppm to high percent.



The Fusion Auto-Sensing Technology (FAST) Enabled detector system automatically adjusts detector gain during a single sample run, effectively eliminating the need of two sensitivity settings when analyzing low ppm and high percentage in the sample. The FAST Enabled Micro GC Fusion is proven to provide excellent linearity over ppm to high percent component concentrations, allowing fast and accurate analyses of gases over a large concentration spread.



A detection limit of 1 ppm can be achieved for some compounds when the analyses method is optimized. The μ TCD detects the difference in thermal conductivity of the gas traveling through the reference column (pure carrier gas) versus the gas traveling through the analytical column (carrier gas plus the sample gas). The difference generates an electrical signal, which when plotted over time creates a chromatogram for the sample gas.

5.7.4 Module Circuit Boards

Micro GC Fusion modules are controlled by two circuit boards: the GC module controller board and the GC module interface board.

5.7.4.1 GC Module Controller Board

The GC module controller board receives commands from the Micro GC Fusion software, performs hardware control of the GC module, and sends the data signal back to the software. The GC module controller board is installed on the Micro GC Fusion chassis frame and is connected to the GC module interface board.



5.7.4.2 GC Module Interface Board

The GC module interface board is the interface between the GC module controller board and the analytical hardware components, including electronics on the injector, the resistively heated GC column, and the detector assembly. The GC module interface board is part of a GC module and attached to the GC module controller board when it is installed into a Micro GC Fusion instrument.




5.8 JP-100

The Micro GC Fusion JP-100 is a 3D printed device that is installed at the back of the Micro GC Fusion modules. For a 1- or 2-module chassis, a single JP-100 controls both modules. For a 3- or 4-module chassis, two JP-100 devices are installed.

Wide changes in ambient temperature can impact μTCD response. This device provides temperature control and stability over the ambient air surrounding the μTCD . Having a consistent μTCD external temperature allows for accurate and repeatable area counts, even when the Micro GC Fusion is subjected to wide ambient temperature ranges. This is important in applications such as natural gas or chemical process control/monitoring where measurements are made at instrument locations that are subjected to wide temperature ranges.

The JP-100 has two method parameters located in the **Method Editor** – **TCD** and **TCD Delta**. The **TCD** parameter allows the user to control the TCD external temperature. The **TCD Delta** parameter allows the user to control the temperature range before the GC becomes ready. This can be set up to 50°C. See Edit Method [> 183] for more details on these method parameters.





5.9 Integrated Sample Conditioner

The optional Integrated Sample Conditioner is factory installed. It maintains the incoming sample at 100°C (212°F) and reduces sample pressure from up to 6,895 kPa (1,000 psi) down to approximately 83 kPa (12 psi) prior to the sample being injected into the GC module.





MARNING

Gas pressure on the HIGH PRESSURE PURGE VENT may be up to 448 kPa (65 psi). Extreme caution must be taken to vent the high pressure sample to avoid personal injury.

5.10 External Sample Conditioner

The External Sample Conditioner (PN 952-004-G1) is an apparatus that mounts to the front of Micro GC Fusion. It maintains the incoming sample temperature at >50°C (122°F) and reduces sample pressure from up to 5516 kPa (800 psi) down to approximately 0-172 kPa (0-25 psi) prior to the sample being introduced to Micro GC Fusion. This minimizes the introduction of contaminants and aerosols onto Micro GC Fusion.

The external sample conditioner can be installed on the front of a 2-module Micro GC Fusion and transported into the field for direct analysis.





A CAUTION

Micro GC Fusion is intended for gas sampling only. Liquid injections will damage the instrument.

Micro GC Fusion Offline Analysis is an offline software (able to be installed on a computer) that allows the user to view and reprocess data. 





In North America, use the CGA 580 inlet connection (PN 952-416-P1) for helium, nitrogen, and argon carrier gas. Use the CGA 350 inlet connection (PN 952-415-P1) for hydrogen carrier gas. For installations outside of North America, use the appropriate standard inlet connections for the region.



A CAUTION

Carrier gas inlet (rear of instrument) pressure must be between 400-427 kPa (58-62 psi). Use a dual-stage regulator on the carrier gas cylinder to ensure the pressure range is maintained.

Exceeding 565 kPa (82 psi) may damage Micro GC Fusion and require factory repair.

 Moisture/hydrocarbon trap (PN G2870A-01) is required for the carrier gas when using Molsieve or Alumina columns



A CAUTION

To protect Micro GC Fusion and enhance performance, carrier gas traps should be used to purify the carrier gas before introduction into Micro GC Fusion.

A moisture/hydrocarbon trap (PN G2870A-01) is recommended.

 Copper or stainless steel tubing (pre-cleaned) 1/8 in. OD for carrier gas connections between the tank regulator output and Micro GC Fusion carrier gas inlet. Micro GC Fusion has up to four 1/8 in. Swagelok male carrier gas inlet connections. 6 | Installation INFICON



3 m (10 ft.) of pre-cleaned GC grade copper tubing is included with Micro GC Fusion. Additional copper tubing is available in the installation kit (PN 952-021-G1), or can be ordered in 15 m (50 ft.) lengths (PN 069-0115).



↑ CAUTION

Do not clean copper or stainless steel tubing with solvent.

The solvent can enter Micro GC Fusion and cause damage to the instrument.



⚠ CAUTION

Do not use Teflon® or Tygon® tubing for carrier gas.

- Assortment of male and female Swagelok fittings for regulator, tubing, etc., including nuts and front and back ferrules. Typical size is 1/8 in. but adaptors for 1/4 in. to 1/8 in. may be needed if 1/4 in. tubing is used
- 1/8 in. tee fitting and 1/8 in. ball valve, depending on connection requirements

6.1.3 Calibration Gas Requirement

Commercially supplied calibration gas specific to the analysis



Calibration gas must be available at the time of installation.



Calibration gas must closely resemble the composition of the actual process gas.

- A regulator, if necessary, to reduce calibration gas pressure below 69 kPa (10 psi) at the Micro GC Fusion inlets. The regulator must be clean, grease-free and non-venting
- Copper or stainless steel tubing (pre-cleaned) 1/16 in. OD for calibration and sample gas connections between the tank regulator output and Micro GC Fusion sample inlet



Checkout gas mixtures are only used for instrument installation and startup.

Checkout gas mixtures supplied by INFICON are not calibration gases.

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When the instrument is configured with a 1/16 in. Swagelok front sample inlet, the ship kit includes a 61 cm (24 in.) 1/16 in. OD piece of stainless steel sample tubing and nuts and ferrules for both ends.

6.1.4 Sample Gas Pressure Range



A CAUTION

Sample inlet gas pressure must be less than 172 kPa (25 psi). Exceeding 172 kPa (25 psi) will damage Micro GC Fusion and require factory repair.

- The maximum pressure for direct sample injection into either the front or rear sample inlet is 172 kPa (25 psi). The recommended input sample pressure is 69 kPa (10 psi) or lower.
- When the Integrated Sample Conditioner is installed, sample pressures up to 6,895 kPa (1,000 psi) can be introduced into the front sample inlet. Sample pressures higher than 6,895 kPa (1,000 psi) must be reduced.

- When a Pressure Reducer and Gas Liquid Separator (PN 952-033-G1) is installed, a sample pressure of up to 3,450 kPa (500 psi) can be introduced.

Micro GC Fusion air pathways must remain unobstructed to allow cooling of the analytical column(s) following a temperature programmed method run. Allow a minimum of 6.5 cm (2.5 in.) clearance to the top, the front, the back, and both sides of the instrument to provide unrestricted air flow to the instrument.

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 Install Micro GC Fusion in a location with easy access to the instrument and associated computer

 For optimum Micro GC Fusion performance and to dissipate heat, do not restrict airflow around Micro GC Fusion



A CAUTION

Ensure the Micro GC Fusion fan exhaust at the back of the instrument is not blocked and the air flow through the bottom of Micro GC Fusion is unobstructed.



A CAUTION

Regularly inspect and clean the filter at the bottom of the instrument.



⚠ WARNING

Safely vent carrier and sample streams - potentially toxic, noxious, asphyxiant (oxygen displacing) or flammable gases - outside Micro GC Fusion and away from the operating area. Vent toxic gases to a fume hood, chemical trap, or reaction medium.

6.2.3 Making Swagelok Connections

A 1/16 in. sample inlet Swagelok connector is located on the Micro GC Fusion faceplate. A 1/8 in. carrier gas Swagelok connector is located on the back of Micro GC Fusion. The vent ports on the back of Micro GC also use 1/8 in. Swagelok connectors.


This section reviews how to construct Swagelok connections and connect tubing to a fitting, such as the sample inlet(s), carrier gas inlet(s), vents, or the gas supply tank.

Materials Needed:

- 1/8 in. OD pre-cleaned copper or stainless steel tubing
- 1/8 in. Swagelok nuts, and front and back ferrules
- Two 7/16 in. wrenches for 1/8 in. tubing
- Two 5/16 in. wrenches for 1/16 in. tubing

Procedure


1 Attach a 1/8 in. Swagelok nut, back ferrule and front ferrule to the tubing.




- 2 Clamp a female fitting in a bench vise.
- **3** Push the tubing into the female fitting.

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
4 Ensure that the front ferrule makes contact with the female fitting, slide the Swagelok nut over the ferrule, then finger tighten.



- 5 Push the tube fully into the female fitting.
- **6** Mark the Swagelok fitting with a pencil line as shown.



7 Tighten the 1/8 in. fitting 3/4 of a turn, referenced to the pencil line, using one 7/16 in. wrench to hold the female fitting steady, and another 7/16 in. wrench to turn the Swagelok fitting.



8 Unscrew the Swagelok fitting. Connect the tubing with the Swagelok fitting and ferrules to the pencil marked location. Tighten the nut 1/4 turn past finger tight.



A CAUTION

Do not overtighten.

Overtightening can damage the fitting and restrict gas flow.

Micro GC Fusion is equipped with a 1/16 in. sample inlet Swagelok connector on the faceplate. Use the same procedure to connect the sample inlet tubing as described for carrier gas inlet tubing in steps 1-8.

If the Integrated Sample Conditioner is installed, the instrument is outfitted with a 1/8 in. quick connect rather than a 1/16 in. sample inlet Swagelok connector.

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6.3 Connecting the Carrier Gas

6.3.1 Carrier Gas Safety



MARNING

Gas cylinders present a hazard when not secured properly. Securely fasten all compressed gas cylinders to an immovable structure or permanent wall. Store and handle compressed gases in accordance with safety procedures.



MARNING

Gas cylinders may present a hazard under extreme temperature conditions. Do not store gas cylinders in the path of heated oven exhausts or other sources of heat. Do not expose cylinders to extreme cold or heat. It is recommended to store or place cylinders in a temperature controlled environment.

Wear eye protection when using compressed gas.



↑ WARNING

Many gases are explosive when their concentration builds up over time due to leaks, poor connections or inadequate ventilation. Verify proper venting prior to using hydrogen or other gases in enclosed environments.

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
6.3.2 Connecting the Carrier Gas Particulate Filter

- 1 Remove the shipping caps from the Micro GC Fusion carrier gas inlet.
- Install one carrier gas particulate filter (PN 059-0701) on the carrier gas supply tubing for each carrier gas used. Do not connect the tubing directly to Micro GC Fusion.



! CAUTION

The carrier gas particulate filter prevents particles in the carrier gas from entering Micro GC Fusion. Connecting carrier gas tubing directly to the carrier gas inlet without installing the carrier gas particulate filter may damage Micro GC Fusion.



- Install the carrier gas particulate filter, using the supplied fittings, within 15 cm (6 in.) of the Micro GC Fusion fitting to maximize its effectiveness
- Use a cut off valve (not provided) for ease of maintenance. The valve should be "packless" (sealed to atmosphere) and grease free. Do not use common industrial or home-supply ball valves
- Chemical traps on the carrier gas line may be used to protect the column

6.3.3 Setting Carrier Gas Pressure

Use a dual-stage regulator to reduce carrier gas tank output pressure down to an appropriate input pressure for Micro GC Fusion. Set the carrier gas output pressure on a dual-stage regulator as shown below.

Carrier Gas	Required Delivery Pressure
helium	400-427 kPa (58-62 psi)
hydrogen	400-427 kPa (58-62 psi)
argon	400-427 kPa (58-62 psi)
nitrogen	400-427 kPa (58-62 psi)

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A CAUTION

Carrier gas inlet (rear of instrument) pressure must be between 400-427 kPa (58-62 psi). Use a dual-stage regulator on the carrier gas cylinder to ensure the pressure range is maintained.

Exceeding 565 kPa (82 psi) may damage Micro GC Fusion and require factory repair.

6.3.4 Purging and Connecting Carrier Gas Line

Prior to connecting carrier gas to Micro GC Fusion, the carrier gas supply line must be purged to remove air. Open the carrier gas supply tank and flush the carrier gas supply line with carrier gas for five to ten seconds.



⚠ DANGER

Many gases are explosive when their concentration builds up over time through leaks, poor connections or a loss of ventilation. Verify system integrity prior to using hydrogen or other gases in enclosed environments.



MARNING

Safely vent carrier and sample streams - potentially toxic, noxious, asphyxiant (oxygen displacing) or flammable gases - outside Micro GC Fusion and away from the operating area. Vent toxic gases to a fume hood, chemical trap, or reaction medium.



A CAUTION

Do not use leak detection fluids.

Immediately after purging the carrier gas line, connect it to the 1/8 in. Swagelok carrier gas connector(s) located on the back of Micro GC Fusion.

6.4 Installing the Sample Inlet Filter

Micro GC Fusion is shipped with an external 10 micron sample inlet filter assembly, one dual-ended ferrule per sample inlet, and extra replacement filter disks.



The sample inlet filter cannot be installed if the Integrated Sample Conditioner is installed. The Integrated Sample Conditioner has a 7 micron filter that provides the same particle filtering capability as the 10 micron filter.

6.4.3 Sample Inlet Filter Assembly Installation

- 1 Shut off sample flow to Micro GC Fusion.
- 2 Reduce the temperature of the sample inlet by loading a method that has a low sample inlet temperature (below 60°C).




MARNING

Micro GC Fusion has a heated inlet which is hot to the touch.

- **3** Wait for Micro GC Fusion sample inlet to cool.
- **4** Disconnect any sample line to Micro GC Fusion input fitting using a 5/16 in. wrench.

5 Inspect the sample inlet filter assembly and verify that the filter disk is in place. If not, place a filter disk between parts A and B of the filter body, thread the parts together until finger tight and then use two 7/16 in. wrenches to tighten an additional 1/4 turn.



- 6 Place the dual-ended ferrule inside Part A.
- 7 Connect the sample inlet filter to the sample inlet.
- **8** Turn Part A clockwise until finger tight, then use a 7/16 in. wrench to tighten an additional 1/4 turn.



A CAUTION

Do not overtighten the sample inlet filter assembly to Micro GC Fusion.

This will damage the dual ended ferrule.

9 Finger tighten the sample line to the male portion of filter Part B, and then use a 5/16 in. wrench to tighten an additional 1/4 turn while stabilizing the sample inlet filter assembly Part B using a 7/16 in. wrench.

6.5.3 Rack Mount Kit Installation

The following procedure indicates the necessary materials and proper procedure when installed the 4-module Micro GC Fusion into a rack.

- 1 Ensure the instrument is turned off and all connections are removed (including the power supply, Ethernet cable and carrier gas lines).
- 2 Remove the rubber feet from the bottom of Micro GC Fusion by removing the hex screw located at the center of the foot. Properly store the rubber feet and screws for future bench top installation.



3 Install brackets (PN 952-4005-P2 and 952-4006-P2) onto the 19 in. rack prior to attaching Micro GC Fusion when access is available from below. Install the rack mount brackets onto the unit prior to rack installation if access to the underside is not available.

⇒ Attach the four retainer nuts to the left bracket (PN 952-4006-P2) in the four hole locations.



⇒ Place the left bracket (PN 952-4006-P2) on the rack, as shown below, and line up the holes with the retainer nuts.





⇒ Thread the oval head screw (PN 090-077) through the washer (PN 070-2028) as shown, then screw the bracket into the retainer nut.



⇒ Repeat the previous step to finish securing the remaining nuts on the left bracket.


- ⇒ To attach the right bracket (PN 952-4005-P2), repeat step 3.
- **4** Once both brackets are secure, gently place Micro GC Fusion onto rack mount brackets.



5 Line up the holes on the bottom of the unit to the holes in the brackets.



6 Secure the instrument on the brackets with the provided flat Phillips head screw (PN 090-062).



7 Micro GC Fusion is now attached to the rack.

6.6 Wired Ethernet Connection

Connect an Ethernet (LAN) cable to the RJ45 connector on the rear of Micro GC Fusion. The other end of this connection can be connected to a computer or Ethernet switching device.

6.6.1 Set Up the Dynamic IP Address

Micro GC Fusion adopts a dynamic IP address and runs Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP) by default. This means no static IP address is preassigned from the factory.


When Micro GC Fusion is connected to a computer through a direct Ethernet cable and the computer is configured to accept an IP address automatically, Micro GC Fusion will dynamically assign an IP address to the computer such that both devices are connected automatically.

Under dynamic IP address mode, Micro GC Fusion is also capable of accepting an IP address when connected to an Ethernet switching device.







6.7 Wireless Connection

Micro GC Fusion enables wireless networking by default. The default wireless signal name **<serial number>.local** and the wireless **password** is **inficongc**. Wireless password protection is provided to prevent accidental or unauthorized access.



To connect a computer or a device to Micro GC Fusion through the wireless connection:

- 1 Locate the wireless connection (**serialnumber-.local**) on the web-enabled wireless device (tablet, computer, smartphone) under available networks.
- **2** Connect using the wireless password (ex. **inficongc**).
- 3 Open a supported web browser.
- 4 Type 10.10.0.1 in the address bar to access the Micro GC Fusion main screen.



Micro GC Fusion runs Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP) on the wireless connection and assigns an IP address to the connected computing device.

6.8 Connecting the Power Supply

6.8.1 2-Module Micro GC Fusion

The 2-module Micro GC Fusion system uses a power supply that accepts 100-240 V (ac) input and provides 24 V (dc) to the instrument.



A CAUTION

Connect the cables in the following order to avoid damage to the instrument.



- 1 Connect the 24V (dc) power connector from the power supply to one end of the 24 V (dc) cable assembly (PN 600-1546-P1). Connect the other end of the 24 V (dc) cable assembly to the 24V power input on the Micro GC Fusion back panel. A "click" will be audible when the power connector is properly connected.
- 2 Micro GC Fusion ships with a country specific power cord. Connect the end of this power cord to the 24 V (dc) power supply (PN 952-435-P1).
- 3 Connect the other end of the power cord to the 100-240 V (ac) power source.

With the power supply properly connected, Micro GC Fusion can be powered on by pressing the **On/Standby** button on the front panel.

6.8.2 4-Module Micro GC Fusion






4 In the **System Configuration** window, click the icon to set the instrument time.



6.11 The AUX I/O Connector

For some applications, an external triggering device may be required for sampling. This can be accomplished by connecting an external triggering device to the Micro GC Fusion AUX I/O port via a Remote Start Cable (PN G2801-60618). This cable has a 15 pin connector at one end. The other end can be fitted with a desired connector type.



6.12 Valco Stream Selector

Micro GC Fusion can be paired with a Valco stream selector from VICI® (Valco® Instruments Co. Inc.) to perform analysis on multiple gas streams. Valco stream selector models EUH, EUD and EUT with USB option are supported.



A Valco stream selector is connected to and controlled by Micro GC Fusion via a USB connection on the back of the instrument. The proper USB cable is provided with the Valco stream selector.



Sample streams can be connected to the Valco stream selector with any one of the following valve types:

- SD: Dead-ended sample streams are dead-ended at the stream selection valve
- SC: Common outlet all sample streams vent to a common outlet port
- SF: Flow-through each sample stream continuously flows through the stream selection valve
- ST: Trapping samples are trapped in sample loops for injection
- STF: Trapping flow-through a variation of the ST: Trapping, except the nonselected streams are returned to their own vents or sources rather than being trapped








When sample or calibration gas is in short supply and sample composition does not change drastically over time, the dead-ended (SD) Valco stream selector is the desired choice.

When sample or calibration gas is abundant and sample composition changes quickly over time, the flow-through (SF) Valco stream selector is the desired choice.

The pre-assembled accessories have 1/16 in. sample line filters installed at each inlet port. These sample lines are leak checked at the factory and are labeled to provide clear identification. For instance, the sample port #1 is labeled as 1 IN and sample port #2 is labeled as 2 IN. The outlet sample line going into the GC is labeled as OUT TO GC.





13 The pressure reducer and gas-liquid separator installation is complete.



14 Reconnect the power cable, the Ethernet cable and the carrier gas lines.

15 Before connecting the pressurized sample to the device, close the metering valve by turning the dial fully clockwise to ensure no sample flow through the device when the pressurized sample is connected.



16 Install a user-provided 1/8 in. sample line with the female Swagelok fittings preinstalled.



17 Connect a vent line to the vent fittings using 1/8 in. Swagelok fittings. Run the exhaust to a fume hood or other designated area for hazardous waste disposal.



18 Slowly open the dial to allow the sample to flow through the device. Check the flow indicated on the flow gauge and set the limit to less than 100 mL/min.

19 Turn on Micro GC Fusion. The instrument is ready to perform an analysis.

If the flow rate through the device exceeds 100 mL/min, the output pressure from the device to Micro GC Fusion may exceed the acceptable pressure range, causing instrument damage.





The cap plugs on the sample inlet and the sample vent of the pressure reducer and gas-liquid separator are not shown in the figure. They must be removed when performing this installation.

- 1 Turn off the instrument by following the system shutdown procedure in Shutdown Procedure [> 273].
- **2** Disconnect all the electrical cables, including the power cable and Ethernet cable, from the instrument.
- **3** Disconnect the sample gas connection(s), the carrier gas connection(s) and the venting connections from the instrument.
- **4** Ensure that Bracket C is positioned with two small holes at the bottom when in the upright position. If not, follow the procedure in Change Mounting Bracket Orientation [▶ 144] to adjust the mounting bracket orientation.





17 Insert the 1/16 in. sample tubing with the Swagelok fittings onto the instrument sample inlet.



18 Tighten 1/2 turn past finger-tight using the 5/16 in. wrench.

6.16 External Sample Conditioner

6.16.1 Introduction

Micro GC Fusion can be damaged by high pressure samples, especially those containing contaminants, such as condensing aerosols. The external sample conditioner (PN 952-004-G1) maintains the sample at $> 50^{\circ}$ C (122°F) and reduces the sample pressure from up to 5516 kPa (800 psi) down to approximately 0-172 kPa (0-25 psi) prior to the sample being introduced to Micro GC Fusion. This minimizes the introduction of contaminants and aerosols onto Micro GC Fusion.

The external sample conditioner can be installed on the front of a 2-module Micro GC Fusion and transported into the field for direct analysis.

NOTICE

The Micro GC Fusion external sample conditioner is designed for use indoors or in a covered area only.





A CAUTION

Micro GC Fusion is intended for gas sampling only. Liquid injections will damage the instrument.

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⚠ WARNING

Gas pressure on the external sample conditioner vent may be up to 5516 kPa (800 psi). Extreme caution must be taken when venting the high pressure sample to avoid personal injury.



MARNING

The external sample conditioner is rated for 5516 kPa (800 psi) input sample pressure.



7 Connecting to a Sample

7.1 Introduction

Micro GC Fusion allows for a variety of sampling techniques including the use of syringes, sample bags, or pressurized cylinders.

7.2 Purging the Sample Path

To obtain an accurate analysis of the sample, always purge the sample line with the sample before connecting it to the sample inlet to remove residual gas in the sample line

When the Integrated Sample Conditioner is configured on an instrument, the Micro GC Fusion main page provides a command button to purge the sample line and the internal volume of the sample conditioner. Refer to Purge Integrated Sample Conditioner [* 270].

7.3 Front Sample Inlet

Micro GC Fusion provides flexible inlet options. Depending on the configuration and chassis type, sample gas may be introduced through a front sample inlet or through an Integrated Sample Conditioner to reduce sample input pressure from up to 6,895 kPa (1,000 psi) to approximately 83 kPa (12 psi).

7.3.1 Front Sample Inlet

The front sample inlet is a 1/16 in. Swagelok male connector. It connects the sample to one or more GC modules, allowing for parallel analyses on multiple GC modules. The front sample inlet is heated and deactivated to avoid sample condensation and adsorption.



A CAUTION

Sample inlet gas pressure must be less than 172 kPa (25 psi). Exceeding 172 kPa (25 psi) will damage Micro GC Fusion and require factory repair.



⚠ WARNING

Micro GC Fusion has a heated inlet which is hot to the touch.

7.3.2 Front Sample Inlet - Integrated Sample Conditioner

When an Integrated Sample Conditioner is installed, the front sample inlet is replaced by a 1/8 in. Quick Connect.



↑ CAUTION

The 1/8 in. HIGH PRESSURE PURGE connector on the back panel should not be restricted when a pressurized sample is flowing.

Doing so will damage the instrument and cause leaks, which is not covered by the warranty.



⚠ WARNING

The 1/8 in. Quick Connect temperature may reach 100°C (212°F).

Touching the Quick Connect at operating temperature can result in injury.

7.4 Sampling Using Gas Cylinders and Canisters

Gas cylinders and canisters can be connected directly to the 1/16 in. Swagelok or 1/8 in. Quick Connect sample inlet. Sample pressures must not exceed 172 kPa (25 psi), or 6,895 kPa (1,000 psi) when the optional Integrated Sample Conditioner is installed.



A CAUTION

Sample inlet gas pressure must be less than 172 kPa (25 psi). Exceeding 172 kPa (25 psi) will damage Micro GC Fusion and require factory repair.



A CAUTION

When using the Integrated Sample Conditioner, sample inlet pressure must not exceed 6,895 kPa (1,000 psi).

Exceeding 6,895 kPa (1,000 psi) will damage Micro GC Fusion and require factory repair.

7.5 Sampling Using Syringes

Use syringes that are gas tight, accurate and have a low dead volume. The syringe must also be compatible with the Micro GC Fusion 1/16 in. Swagelok front inlet. The following are the general steps to sample using a syringe.

- 1 Connect the syringe to the gas source.
- **2** Fill the syringe with sample gas by drawing the syringe plunger to the desired volume.
- 3 Disconnect the syringe from the sample gas, and connect it to the GC inlet.
- **4** Depress the plunger using a slight pressure to inject when the GC is ready to sample.

7.5.1 Syringe Sampling Kits

The Ship Kit - Syringe Luer Adapator (PN 952-024-G1) includes a luer fitting which will adapt the PTFE luer lock termination on the gas tight syringe to the 1/16 in. sample inlet on Micro GC Fusion. The short needle on the adaptor allows for a quick transfer of the sample from a syringe into Micro GC Fusion.



The Ship Kit 50 mL Syringe and Luer Adaptor (PN 952-025-G1) includes a 50 mL gas tight syringe with PTFE luer lock termination and a Syringe Luer Adaptor (PN 952-024-G1).



7 | Connecting to a Sample INFICON

7.5.2 Installing a Syringe Luer Lock Adapter onto a Gas Tight Syringe

- **1** Attach the luer fitting of the Syringe Luer Adapter (PN 952-024-G1) to the PTFE luer lock termination of the gas tight syringe.
- 2 Turn the luer fitting on the Syringe Luer Adapter clockwise until finger tight.



7.6 Sampling Using Bags

- 1 Open a new sample bag.
- 2 Connect the sample bag to the sample source.
- 3 Open the sample source.
- **4** Fill the sample bag, close it, and disconnect from the sample source.
- 5 Close the sample source.
- **6** Connect the sample bag to the Micro GC Fusion inlet using stainless steel or Teflon tubing.



An adapter may be required to connect the tubing to the Micro GC Fusion 1/16 in. Swagelok front inlet.

7 Open the sample bag when the GC is ready to sample.

7.6.1 Sample Bag Sampling Kits

The Ship Kit - SS Adapter for Sample Bag (PN 952-026-G1) includes a 3/16 in. to 1/16 in. stainless steel reducing union (PN 059-0298), a Teflon front ferrule (PN 059-0263) and a Teflon back ferrule (PN 059-0264) to adapt the polypropylene tube fitting on a sample bag to a 1/16 in. stainless steel sample line.



The Ship Kit - SS Adapter and 10/Pack 3L Sample Bag (PN 952-027-G1) includes one Ship Kit - SS Adapter for Sample Bag (PN 952-026-G1) and ten 3 L sample bags with polypropylene screw cap valve (PN 070-1726).



7.6.2 Installing a SS Adapter onto a Sample Bag

- 1 Remove the 3/16 in. nut from the reducing union (PN 059-0298).
- 2 Remove the stainless steel front and back ferrules from the 3/16 in. stainless steel nuts.



7 | Connecting to a Sample INFICON

3 Place the Teflon front ferrule and the Teflon back ferrule into the 3/16 in. stainless steel nut.

⇒ Place the Teflon back ferrule into the nut with the narrow end facing outwards.



⇒ Place the Teflon front ferrule into the nut with the narrow end facing outwards. The two ferrules are designed to fit together.



4 Screw the 3/16 in. stainless steel nut with the Teflon ferrules back into the reducing union (PN 059-0298).

7.8 Sampling Using the Pressure Reducer and Gas-Liquid Separator

The pressure reducer and gas-liquid separator (PN 952-033-G1) reduces sample pressure and filters out liquid particulates in the sample. The maximum sample input pressure is 3450 kPa (500 psi). Refer to Pressure Reducer Genie Filter and Gas-Liquid Separator [▶ 119] for the device installation procedure.





The pressure reducer and gas-liquid separator is not compatible with the integrated sample conditioner of the gas-liquid separator (PN 952-022-G1).



⚠ CAUTION

The gas-liquid separator filters out liquid droplets in a gas sample. It is not intended for liquid injections.

7.9 Sampling Using the Integrated Sample Conditioner

The optional Integrated Sample Conditioner is factory installed. It maintains the incoming sample at 100°C (212°F) and reduces the sample pressure from up to 6,895 kPa (1,000 psi) down to 83 kPa (12 psi) prior to the sample being injected into the GC module.





MARNING

Gas pressure on the HIGH PRESSURE PURGE VENT may be up to 448 kPa (65 psi). Extreme caution must be taken to vent the high pressure sample to avoid personal injury.

7.10 Sampling Using the External Sample Conditioner

- 1 Attach a 1/4 in. male Quick Connect (PN 059-0808S) to the sample line.
- 2 Set the sample line pressure regulator to < 5515 kPa (800 psi).

A pressure regulator must be present on the sample line to ensure that the sample does not exceed 5515 kPa (800 psi).

3 Attach the 1/4 in. male Quick Connect to the external sample conditioner female quick connect port. It will click into place.



4 Before turning the sample on, ensure the manual valve is in the **Vent** position.





⚠ WARNING

Safely vent sample stream vent ports using the appropriate sized tubing for each connection. Potentially toxic, noxious, asphyxiant (oxygen displacing) or flammable gasses should be vented outside Micro GC Fusion and away from the operating area. Vent toxic gases to a fume hood, chemical trap, or reaction medium.

5 Turn the sample on and purge for the desired time to ensure an accurate sample. This time will vary depending upon amount of sample available and the length of the sample line.



⚠ WARNING

Gas pressure on the HIGH PRESSURE PURGE VENT may be up to 5515 kPa (800 psi). Extreme caution must be taken to avoid personal injury.

- **6** Turn the manual valve to the **Sample** position.
- 7 Conduct a run using Micro GC Fusion software.
- 8 When finished with the sample, shut off the gas source.
- 9 To depressurize the system, slowly turn the manual valve halfway towards the Vent position.
- Monitor the pressure regulator on the sample line. When the regulator reads 0 psi, the external sample conditioner is depressurized and it is safe to remove the sample line.
- 11 Press on the female Quick Connect fitting to release the sample line.

8.1 Introduction

The front panel display on Micro GC Fusion can be used to:

- · load a method or a sequence
- · run a method or a sequence
- · view reports and chromatograms
- · view the system status


More detailed operation such as editing a method, viewing previous runs, editing integration events, and entering calibration data can only be performed by connecting an external computer or tablet.



The front panel user interface described in this section references features delivered in Fusion software v1.8 release.

8.2 Launch Software

The Micro GC Fusion front panel display turns on when the **On/Standby** button is pressed. A splash screen is displayed.




Once the system completes activation, the main page is displayed.

8.3 Select and Load a Method or Sequence

A method or sequence can be loaded on Micro GC Fusion by selecting the corresponding method or sequence preset button in the **Run** tab on the front panel display.



Methods and sequences can be loaded onto the Micro GC Fusion front panel display via the web-based software. See Software Operation [▶ 178].




Methods cannot be created or edited on the Micro GC Fusion front panel display. See Method Development [▶ 181], to develop a method on a tablet or computer.

Perform the following steps to load a method or sequence onto the front panel display.

- 1 Select the desired method or sequence preset button on the front panel display.
- 2 The center button will display **Loading** until the instrument has reached the programmed method setpoints. Load times may vary depending on the method parameters.



3 The selected method or sequence is framed in green. The method and/or sequence name displays on the front panel.

8.4 Run a Loaded Method or Sequence

Perform the following steps to run a loaded method or sequence from the Micro GC Fusion front panel display:

- 1 Ensure the desired method or sequence is loaded. If not, load the desired method or sequence by following the steps in Select and Load a Method or Sequence [* 170].
- 2 Tap the green **RUN** button to begin a sample run.



3 The RUN button displays Running and the process of the run is indicated by the movement of the blue band on the circumference of the button.



4 Once the run is completed and the starting method conditions are met, the green RUN button reappears.


8.5 Stop a Sequence

Multiple runs may be programmed into a sequence. Once a sequence is started, the green **RUN** button on the Micro GC Fusion front panel display changes to a red **STOP** button, which can be used to stop a running sequence.

1 While a sequence is running, tap the **STOP** button to abort the sequence.



2 Micro GC Fusion finishes the current run and returns to the initial state of the currently loaded method. This may take a few minutes depending on the progress and duration of the interrupted method. A notification is displayed advising the sequence will stop when the current run completes.

Micro GC Fusion is equipped with the Fusion Auto-Sensing Technology, known as *FAST Enabled*, automatically adjusts the gain of the detector during a sample run, providing fast and accurate analyses of gases within a large concentration range. Prior to being *FAST Enabled*, the instrument provided standard or high sensitivity settings to detect high ppm to percentage and low ppm to high ppm components, respectively.

9.4.3 Copy Method or Sequence

- 1 In the Methods/Sequences window, select the desired method or sequence.



When a run is completed, calibrated compound names, retention times, area counts, height counts, compound concentrations (if calibrated), and normalized amounts are displayed in the **Report** tab. Click **mol**% to change the view to **ppm**, and vice versa. The total un-normalized concentration is displayed at the bottom.






9.10.10.2 Integration Parameters

Micro GC Fusion uses a default set of integration parameters to calculate the area under each peak.

The method must be recalibrated after integration parameters have been saved to the method, as area counts may have changed. Once the method is saved, all future runs will have the integration events applied. Runs conducted before the change can be reprocessed to reflect the new changes.

- 1 In the data browser, ensure that the desired run is selected.
- 2 Click the icon to enter the calibration window.
- 3 Click the Integration tab.
- **4** Click the ✓ icon. Select the module from the shortcut menu.
- 5 Click the icon to add an integration parameter to the list. A blank row is displayed.



6 For more control over peak integration, edit the Parameters. Integration parameters can be set for the entire duration of the run, or can be specified for a specific retention time range using the Start Time (s) and Stop Time (s) columns.



7 Click on any of the **Parameter** shortcut menus to select an integration parameter. For additional information on integration events, please see the relevant section:




9.10.10.2.1 Baseline Window

The **Baseline Window** parameter changes the size of the search window used at each point along the peak. Valid **Value** set points are between 0 and 20. Changing this parameter changes the way the peak integrates to the baseline.



9.10.10.2.2 Group Peaks


The **Group Peaks** parameter sums the area underneath all peaks within a specified retention time range. A black bar is displayed above the grouped peaks.



Once a retention time range is specified, the group can be calibrated in the **Compound** tab.


9.10.10.2.3 Manual Integration

The **Manual Integration** parameter allows the user to enter a start and stop time to manually integrate a peak. Manual integration provides finer control of the baseline integration for a specified retention time range.




9.10.10.2.4 Min Height Threshold

The **Min Height Threshold** parameter allows the user to specify the minimum peak height the integrator detects.




9.10.10.2.5 No Peaks

The **No Peaks** parameter stops integration within a specified retention time range.




9.10.10.2.6 Start Sensitivity

The **Start Sensitivity** parameter influences the start point of peaks within a specified retention time range. Valid **Value** set points are 0 to 100, with 50 being the default. Values closer to 0 start the peak sooner, values closer to 100 start the peak later. It is recommended to increment the **Value** by steps of 1 from the default setting to move the start point of the peaks.




9.10.10.2.7 Stop Sensitivity

The **Stop Sensitivity** parameter influences the stopping point of peaks within a specified retention time range. Valid **Value** set points are 0 to 100, with 50 being the default. Values closer to 0 will stop the peak sooner, values closer to 100 will stop the peak later. It is recommended to increment the **Value** by steps of 1 from the default setting to move the end point of the peaks.




9.10.10.2.8 Peak Sensitivity

The **Peak Sensitivity** parameter allows the increase or decrease of the sensitivity of the auto-integration software. Decreasing the value provides more sensitive results. Increasing the value can reduce noise or undesired peaks.




9.10.10.2.9 Forced Baseline

The **Forced Baseline** parameter allows the user to specify a retention time where the baseline starts for succeeding peaks. For peaks eluting before the specified retention time, the baseline end changes when appropriate.



9.10.10.2.10 Negative Peaks

The **Negative Peaks** parameter allows the user to enter a start and stop time to manually integrate a negative peak.




9.10.10.3 Single Level Calibration


To display compound names and concentrations on the report, the method must contain a list of calibrated compounds. A single level calibration uses a single data point for a compound in a calibration gas with a known concentration to generate a linear plot of area count (μ V) versus concentration (mole% or ppm). This plot will be used to calculate the concentration of an unknown concentration of the calibrated compound.

INFICON recommends conducting multiple runs of the calibration gas and using the last run to perform the calibration. This thoroughly purges the sample path with the calibration gas and ensures the best calibration accuracy.

- 1 In the **Data Browser** window, select the data file for the calibration gas.
- 3 By default, the Module A Compounds tab displays.
- 4 Click the icon to add a peak.
- 5 The message Click on a peak in chromatogram to add displays. Click on the desired peak to add its corresponding retention time, or RT(s), to the table.




- 6 Type in the Compound Name for the peak.
- 7 The left RT(s) and right RT (s) columns define the retention time window. Edit the retention time start and end points. The retention time window displays as a yellow shaded bar surrounding the peak.



8 Type the concentration of the compound as listed on the calibration gas standard certificate of analysis. Click mole% under Concentration to change units to ppm, and vice versa. An area count (in μVs) is generated in the Area column. The Fit Type Linear Forced Zero populates by default.



9 Click on the icon to display the calibration curve. A goodness of fit (R²) value displays. The slope of the calibration curve corresponds to the compound's response factor.



10 Repeat steps 4 to 9 for all compounds.

Click the icon to select another module, if configured. If there isn't another module, skip to step 13.

12 Repeat steps 4 to 11 for each additional module.



- 13 Click the icon to save the calibration to the method. A window will prompt the user to save the calibration. To override the current method, use the original method name. An icon will indicate that there are unsaved changes.
- 14 Click the icon.



15 A message will prompt the user to reload the method and apply the calibration. The method is now calibrated for a single level.

Method is currently loaded. You will need to reload it in order to reflect the latest changes.

To reprocess the calibrated run with the new information, click the icon. A confirmation message will display **Are you sure you want to reprocess the X selected run(s)?** Click the continuous icon to reprocess the run.



17 A confirmation message will display.



18 Click the icon to exit the calibration window.

9.10.10.4 Recalibration

It is often necessary to recalibrate a method to ensure best analysis accuracy. Causes of recalibration may include a new calibration cylinder is obtained, the instrument is powered on after a long storage time, or to follow an organization established routine recalibration protocol. This procedure will replace all area counts for all compounds.

To recalibrate a method using a new run:


- 1 Conduct an analysis of the calibration gas standard. INFICON recommends conducting multiple runs of each calibration gas and using the last run to perform the calibration. Doing so thoroughly purges the sample path with the calibration gas, which ensures the best calibration accuracy.
- 2 In the **Data Browser** window, select the data file for the calibration gas.
- 3 Click the icon to enter the calibration window.




⇒ Ensure the desired data file is selected and click to display a window. Select **Replace calibration** and click the icon.



Average Replicates - Select multiple runs from the calibration gas and click to display a window. Click to confirm you want to average the areas of the individual compounds in the calibrated method. The runs used in average replicates appear with a to each run.



4 The Area (μV) column will automatically populate with the new area counts for all compounds in the run. The name of the calibration will be replaced with the currently selected run. When using average replicates, one of the data files used in the calculation will be used as the reference chromatogram for the calibration.



- **5** If using a new calibration gas standard, type the **Concentration** of the compound as listed on the calibration gas standard certificate of analysis.
- 6 Click the icon to save the new calibration to the method. A window will prompt the user to save the calibration. To override the current method, use the original method name. An icon will indicate that there are unsaved changes.
- 7 Click the icon.

8 A message will prompt the user to reload the method and apply the calibration.

Method is currently loaded. You will need to reload it in order to reflect the latest changes.

- 9 To reprocess the calibrated run with the new information, click the icon. A confirmation message will display **Are you sure you want to reprocess the X selected run(s)?** Click the icon to reprocess the run. To apply the new calibration to prior runs, select the desired runs from the list before clicking the icon.
- 10 A confirmation message will display.






- 12 Click the updated method preset to reload the method.

9.10.10.5 Recalibrate the Area of a Single Peak

Often, it is desired to change integration events for a specific peak from a calibration gas standard run. Many integration events change the area count underneath the peak, which requires an updated area count in the Calibration tab. When calibrating for the first time, area counts for peaks are generated automatically once the peak is entered into the table. When recalibrating, a user may want to only change integration on a single peak.


- 1 Conduct an analysis of the calibration gas standard. INFICON recommends conducting multiple runs of each calibration gas and using the last run to perform the calibration. Doing so thoroughly purges the sample path with the calibration gas, which ensures the best calibration accuracy.
- 2 In the **Data Browser** window, select the data file for the calibration gas.
- 3 Click the icon to enter the calibration window.
- 4 Click the Integration tab.
- 5 Edit the desired integration Parameter.





- 6 Click the Compounds tab.
- 7 Click the icon next to the edited compound to populate a new area count. If the selected run is not the calibration reference data file, the calibration reference data file will open to acquire the new data to update the area. This insures consistency in respect to which data file was used to perform the calibration.





- 8 Click the icon to save the new calibration to the method. A window will prompt the user to save the calibration. To override the current method, use the original method name. An icon will indicate that there are unsaved changes.
- 9 Click the icon.
- 10 A message will prompt the user to reload the method and apply the calibration.

Method is currently loaded. You will need to reload it in order to reflect the latest changes.



- To reprocess the calibrated run with the new information, click the confirmation message will display **Are you sure you want to reprocess the X selected run(s)?** Click the confirmation to prior runs, select the desired runs from the list before clicking the con.
- 12 A confirmation message will display.



- 14 Click the updated method preset to reload the method.

9.10.10.6 Second Level Calibration

If a second level calibration is required, a calibration gas standard of different concentration levels must be run using the same analytical method as the first level calibration. A multi-point calibration utilizes multiple data points from runs of the different calibration gas cylinders. The plot of area count (μ V) versus concentration (mol% or ppm) will be used to calculate the concentration of an unknown amount of the calibrated compound.

- 1 Calibrate a single level by following Single Level Calibration [233].
- 2 Introduce a second level calibration gas.
- 3 Conduct an analysis of the second level calibration gas. INFICON recommends conducting multiple runs of each calibration gas and using the last run to perform the calibration. Doing so thoroughly purges the sample path with the calibration gas, which ensures the best calibration accuracy.
- **4** In the data browser, select the data file for the calibration gas corresponding to the second level.
- 5 Click the oicon to enter the calibration window.
- 6 By default, Module A will display.
- 7 Click and a window is displayed. Select Add new level to calibration. Click the icon.




- 8 The Concentration and Area (μV) columns will be blank. The name of the calibration will be replaced with the currently selected run.
- 9 Type the **Concentration** of the compound as listed on the calibration gas standard certificate of analysis. An area count (in μV) will populate in the **Area** column.

10 To view a different calibration level, select the level from the shortcut menu.

11 Click on the icon to display the calibration curve. A second level calibration point will display on the curve.



12 Click the **Fit Type** shortcut menu to change the fit type, if desired.



13 Click the icon to select another module, if configured. Otherwise, skip to step 15.

14 Click the icon to save the calibration to the method. A window will prompt the user to save the calibration. To override the current method, use the original method name. An △ icon will indicate that there are unsaved changes.

- 15 Click the icon.
- **16** A message will prompt the user to reload the method and apply the calibration.

Method is currently loaded. You will need to reload it in order to reflect the latest changes.

- To reprocess the calibrated run with the new information, click the icon. A confirmation message will display **Are you sure you want to reprocess the X selected run(s)?** Click the icon to reprocess the run. To apply the new calibration to prior runs, select the desired runs from the list before clicking the icon.
- 18 A confirmation message will display.



- 19 Click the icon to exit the calibration window.
- **20** The method is now calibrated for two levels. Click the icon to return to the main page.
- 21 Click the updated method preset to reload the method.
- 22 For more than two calibration levels, repeat steps 2 through 21 as necessary.

9.10.10.7 Manual Response Factors

Often, certain compounds are not available in a calibration gas mix. If the response factor is known or if the response factor can be determined from another compound, a **Manual Response** Factor can be used in lieu of calibration gas.


To access the Manual Response Factor:

- 2 Click **Data Browser** to open the data browser window.
- 3 Select a run to calibrate. Only one run can be calibrated at a time.







9.10.10.8.1 Single Level Calibration

- 1 Create a **Sequence** called **Calibration**. (See Add Sequence [> 190])
- 2 From the shortcut menu, select Calibration Runs.



3 Type the number of step repetitions and the method. If desired, add a delay between each repetition.



- 4 Type the number of runs to average and the level in which the averaging should take place.
 - ⇒ Average Last The number of previous runs used when averaging component areas. This is known as "Average Replicates."
 - ⇒ **Level** The level in which the auto-calibration should take place. Within this level the component areas will be replaced as long as the new values are within 10% of the previous value. A single level calibration should have the number 1 entered after level.
- **5** Click the Licon to save the sequence.
- 6 Run the sequence. (See Run Sequence [▶ 197])


9.10.10.8.2 Multi-Level Calibration

Create several sequences corresponding to the calibration level using the method described in Single Level Calibration [> 248].

Example - An auto-calibration sequence for level 3 would be named **Level 3 Calibration** and have a **3** typed in the **Calibration Runs Level** field.

9.10.10.8.3 Multi-Level Calibration using a Valco Stream Selector

- 1 Create a sequence called **Auto-Calibration**. See Add Sequence [▶ 190].
- 2 Add a Valco Stream Selector switching event and switch to the first calibration gas.



- **4** Type the number of step repetitions and the method. If desired, add a delay between each repetition.
- **5** Type the number of runs to use while averaging the area.

- 9 Select Calibration Runs.

10 Type **2** for a level 2 calibration.



- 11 Repeat steps 7 through 10 until you have reached the desired number of levels.
- 12 Click do save the sequence.
- **13** Run the **Auto-Calibration** sequence after all the calibration gases are connected.

9.10.11 Reprocess Runs

Often it is desirable to edit integration parameters and adjust retention time windows after a run is completed, without adjusting the calibration information.

After a run is performed:



- 9 Click the icon to exit the calibration window.
- 10 View the desired run(s) by double-clicking on the run, or by selecting the run and clicking the \(\text{\text{\text{\text{clicking on the run}}} \) icon.
- 11 The chromatogram(s) and report(s) will display the updated information.

9.11 Micro GC Fusion Offline Analysis

Micro GC Fusion Offline Analysis allows the user to view and reprocess data on a standalone computer. It offers a similar work flow and capability as the Micro GC Fusion Data Browser, but without the need to connect to an instrument. The operation of Micro GC Fusion Offline Analysis, unless otherwise specified, is the same as the Data Browser operation document in Data Browser [> 205].

Micro GC Fusion Offline Analysis is a licensed product. The license certificate (PN 952-035-G1) provides the license certificate ID and software download instructions. The software installation procedure is available on the Micro GC Fusion product website.



Perform the following steps to activate Micro GC Fusion Offline Analysis:

- 1 Please have the License Certificate ID printed on this certificate available.
- 2 Download the Micro GC Fusion Offline Analysis software onto your computer from http://www.inficon.com/downloads/software-downloads/
- 3 Run the Micro GC Fusion Offline Analysis installer. The detailed instructions for setup and installation are available in the Micro GC Fusion Offline Analysis Installation Instruction Sheet, which is available for download on the Micro GC Fusion product website at http://products.inficon.com/en-us/nav-products/product/detail/micro-gc-fusion-gas-analyzer/

9.11.1 Initializing Micro GC Fusion Offline Analysis

The Micro GC Fusion Offline Analysis icon is present on the desktop after the installation of the Micro GC Fusion Offline Analysis software package. Double-click on the Micro GC Fusion Offline Analysis icon and the software will open in your default Internet browser.


9.11.2 Tray Icon

A system tray icon appears after the software is started, indicating the Micro GC Fusion Offline Analysis service is running in the background. The tray icon is identical to the desktop icon. The tray icon can be used to launch the browser, restart service and exit service.


9.11.2.1 Launch the Browser

The Micro GC Fusion Offline Analysis interface can be launched from the tray icon in two ways:

Refer to Valco Stream Selector [> 91] for an introduction to the connection between a Valco stream selector and a Micro GC Fusion, and supported valve types.

9.12.1 Valco Stream Selector Configuration

To access the Valco stream selector valve configuration:



9.13 Automatic Appending CSV File

The procedure below demonstrates how to use Micro GC Fusion to create continuously updated comma separated value (CSV) files from calibrated methods using Python software. Running this CSV script appends a new row of analysis results to the end of a .CSV logfile after each new run has completed.

The CSV file contains the following information:

- · time and name of run
- · concentration and normalized concentration for each calibrated compound
- · area count and retention time for each calibrated compound

At least one compound must be calibrated for a meaningful logfile.

When the Valco Stream Selector is connected, the name of the run field is replaced by the **port name** defined in the **Valve Configuration** screen.

9.13.1 Install Python Software

Python is a free and open source scripting language that is widely used for scientific data analysis. To install Python, download the latest installer from **https://www.python.org/**. Either Python v2.7 or v3.5.2 or above will work for this example. Select v3.5.2 or above, unless integrating with older Python code.

To install Python 3.5.2 or above on Windows:

- 1 Download the file **python-3.5.2.exe** or latest version.
- 2 Locate the file on the computer and double click to on python-3.5.2.exe or latest version.
 - ⇒ When prompted by the installer, check Add Python 3.5 or PATH option.



3 Click Install Now to continue the installation.

4 Click Close to complete the installation.



9.13.1.1 Install Python Packages

In order to create an appending CSV file, Python requires certain packages to be installed.

1 Click the Windows Start button and type cmd into the search bar. Click the cmd program to open the Windows command prompt.



2 In the command prompt window, type pip install -U requests python-dateutil.

If the error **Pip is not recognized as an internal or external command** appears, check that **python.exe** was added to the path in Step 2. Including **-U** in the command ensures that the packages are up to date.

9.13.2 Copy the CSV Script to the Computer

The CSV script must be saved on the computer in order to generate the file.

- Open a supported browser.
- 2 Type http://products.inficon.com/GetAttachment.axd?attaName=47f0f3f3ffcf- 4fef-bad2-2ecf34b579eb in the web browser address bar.
- 3 Press the Enter and the csv-log.py file will be saved in the designated download location

9.13.3 Customize the CSV Script

The CSV script must be updated to connect to Micro GC Fusion and to specify the location for the .CSV logfile on the computer.

- 1 Once downloaded to the computer, right-click the csv-log.py file.
- 2 Select Edit with IDLE or Open with Notepad.
- 3 Under IP Address of MicroGC Fusion instrument is a host variable which must be changed to the IP address of the instrument. Replace the quoted name with the IP address of the instrument. For example, host = '192.168.1.172.'
- 4 Enter a destination for the files to be stored under Folder for CSV Files.
 Replace the quotes location with the desired file location using double back slashes. For example, filesPrefix = 'C:\\Desktop\\CSVs Python\\.'

9.13.4 Run the CSV Script


The CSV script can be run using one of two procedures.

9.13.4.1 Run the Script by Double-Clicking the csv-log.py File

1 Double-click on the csv-log.py file. A window and confirmation message will display. This method will not show any errors, if present.




2 Once the script is running, information will be automatically added to the CSV file at the completion of the run. A confirmation message will display in the Python window.




Do not close this Python window when appending to the logfile. Closing the Python window will terminate the Python script.

9.13.4.2 Run the Script Through the IDLE Editor

- 1 Right-click on the csv-log.py file and select Edit with IDLE.
- 2 In the IDLE editor, press the F5 key. A Python window will display. A confirmation message will display Logging analysis from instrument X.X.X.X.



3 Once the script is running, information will be automatically added to the CSV file at the completion of the run. A confirmation message will display in the Python window.



Do not close this Python window when appending to the logfile. Closing the Python window will terminate the Python script.


9.13.5 Viewing the CSV File

A CSV file will generate with the name of the method. Any run using that method will append to the method specific file.

Each method will have its own CSV file.



To view the file, right-click on the file and select **Open with Microsoft Excel** or **Open with Notepad**.




9.14 EZ IQ or OpenLab EZChrom Instrument Control

Micro GC Fusion is compatible with INFICON EZ IQ and Agilent OpenLAB CDS EZChrom Edition software (OpenLAB EZChrom). To connect the Micro GC Fusion to either software, the Micro GC Fusion driver for EZ IQ or OpenLAB EZChrom must be installed on the computer and a License Certificate for EZ IQ or OpenLAB Access (PN 952-389-G1) must be purchased from INFICON and installed on the Micro GC Fusion.

Each License Certificate ID enables one Micro GC Fusion to be controlled by EZ IQ or OpenLAB EZChrom. If EZ IQ or OpenLAB EZChrom are to control two Micro GC Fusions, then two License Certificates are needed, one for each Micro GC instrument.

The License Certificate for EZ IQ or OpenLAB Access (PN 952-389-G1) provides step by step instructions on downloading and installing the license file onto Micro GC Fusion.



The Micro GC Fusion EZ IQ or OpenLAB EZ Chrom driver is available for download from http://www.inficon.com/tabid/244/en-US/default.aspx.

9.15 Externally Triggering Runs

Sample runs can be automatically triggered externally by electrical contact closure via the Micro GC Fusion AUX I/O port. Refer to The AUX I/O Connector [▶ 90] for the AUX I/O port configuration information.



External triggers will not work while using EZ IQ or OpenLab EZChrom.

9.15.1 Start Run(s)

To start a run externally through AUX I/O:

- 1 Load the desired method or sequence on the Micro GC Fusion. Refer to Run Method [▶ 196] for the detailed procedure.
- 2 Close the corresponding pins on the AUX I/O connector to trigger the REMOTE_START action. Refer to The AUX I/O Connector [▶ 90] for the AUX I/O pinouts and contact closure actions.

If a run is in progress when the external triggering action is issued, the external triggering action is discarded.

The name of the run will be defaulted to the loaded method name or the loaded sequence name.

9.15.2 Cancel Sequence

To cancel a sequence externally through AUX I/O, close corresponding pins on the AUX I/O connector to trigger the REMOTE_CANCEL action.


If a sequence is in progress, the current run will proceed to completion. The rest of the sequence will be aborted and the instrument will return to the **ready** state.

9.16 Purge Integrated Sample Conditioner

The Micro GC Fusion main page provides two ways to purge the internal volume of the Integrated Sample Conditioner and the sample line connecting to it.

9.16.1 Automatic Purging

The user can select the purge time and the flow rate when setting up a method.



When a method run is started, Micro GC Fusion will purge the Integrated Sample Conditioner with a fresh sample from the sample line for the defined amount of time.

9.16.2 Manual Purging

The user can perform a manual purge of the integrated sample conditioner by clicking on the purge sample conditioner icon located at the bottom of the web user interface.



A manual purge uses **high flow rate** mode to purge the sample path.



⚠ CAUTION

The 1/8 in. HIGH PRESSURE PURGE connector on the back panel should not be restricted when a pressurized sample is flowing.

Doing so will damage the instrument and cause leaks, which is not covered by the warranty.

9.17 Storage Limit Behavior


The Micro GC Fusion hard drive is capable of storing thousands of runs. However, when the data browser becomes full and the storage capacity has been reached, the user can specify which files Micro GC Fusion will save. The percentage of storage space currently being used is available in the **System Configuration** window.

To access this setting:

- 1 Click the icon.
- 2 Click the System Administration button.




3 Click on System Configuration.



4 There are two options listed under **Storage Limit Behavior** - **Automatic** and **Manual**. To view a description of each, click on the ② icon.

⇒ **Automatic** - Once the storage limit reaches 95% capacity, the oldest 100 runs will automatically be deleted.

➡ Manual - System users are responsible for saving and removing data from the system as the storage limit approaches capacity. Upon max capacity, the instrument will no longer save new data.



- 5 Select the desired setting.
- 6 Click the Licon to save the setting.

10 Routine Operation

10.1 Shutdown Procedure

Press the On/Standby button once to shutdown Micro GC Fusion. This shutdown procedure will cool down the analytical columns before powering down. If the analytical column temperature is high upon shutdown, this procedure may take up to 1 to 2 minutes.

The front panel display will turn off when the instrument is in standby mode.



⚠ CAUTION

Bypassing the shutdown procedure and abruptly disconnecting the power supply to Micro GC Fusion may result in instrument damage.

In the event the instrument is unresponsive, the recommended shutdown procedure can be bypassed by pressing the On/Standby button for 3 or more seconds until the front panel display turns off.



A CAUTION

The instrument remains powered while in standby mode. Disconnect the power supply to power off the instrument completely.



A CAUTION

Pressing the On/Standby button twice in quick succession will force shutdown of the instrument without cooling down the columns. This action can lead to column performance degradation.

10.2 Column Conditioning

Over time, small amounts of contaminants may accumulate in the analytical column causing ghost peaks, peak tailing, and/or retention time shifts. Column temperature programmed methods can be optimized to flush contaminants and high boiling point compounds with each run, however, a column bakeout may occasionally still be needed. A bakeout should be performed:

- · after the initial installation
- · after installing a replacement GC module
- after Micro GC Fusion has been powered off or stored for an extended period of time
- after Micro GC Fusion has been stored in a shipping case for an extended period of time
- · periodically as needed to refresh column performance

10.2.1 Bakeout from System Status

Perform the following steps to implement a bakeout on Micro GC Fusion. Depending on the column type, bakeout temperatures will be set according to the isothermal temperatures indicated in Create a Custom Bakeout Method [275].

- 1 Click the icon.
- 2 Click **Methods/Sequences**, followed by the icon.
- 3 Type a bakeout duration in minutes. The bakeout duration should be within the isothermal temperature duration described in Create a Custom Bakeout Method [275].



4 Click the **②** icon to begin the bakeout operation.



A CAUTION

Carrier gas must be on (flowing) during a bakeout to avoid damaging Micro GC Fusion.

10.2.2 Create a Custom Bakeout Method

Alternately, a bakeout method can be created and customized. A bakeout method can be created by modifying the final temperature and/or hold time of an existing temperature programmed or isothermal analytical method.





To create a bakeout method:

- 1 Click the icon.
- 2 Click the Methods/Sequences button.
- 3 In the Methods/Sequences window, select the desired method for editing.
- 4 Click the icon to copy the method.




5 Type Bakeout in the Enter new name box.

6 Click OK.



- 7 Edit **Temperature Profile** to set the column temperature to the recommended bakeout temperature described in the table for each configured module.
 - ⇒ Set the Inject (ms) time and Sample Pump Time(s) to 0.



- 8 Click the icon to save the method. The **Methods/Sequences** window will display.
- 9 In the Methods/Sequences screen, click the Bakeout method and click the LOAD button to load the Bakeout method onto Micro GC Fusion.



10.3 Updating Micro GC Fusion Software



The software user interface described in this manual references features delivered in the Fusion software v1.8 release.



A CAUTION

Do not upgrade Micro GC Fusion instruments that have a 6 in. diagonal front panel display. These instruments have an older style motherboard that is incompatible with current versions of the software.

To update the Micro GC Fusion software to the latest version:

- 1 Download the latest software from the software download area on the INFICON website.
 - ⇒ Go to www.INFICON.com.
 - ⇒ Click **Downloads**.
 - ⇒ Click the **Software** tab.
 - ⇒ Locate and click the Micro GC Fusion software.
 - ⇒ Read any release notes or **Read Me** files.
 - ⇒ Fill in user information requested and click **Start Download**.
 - ⇒ The software download is in compressed format (.zip). After downloading the compressed file, uncompress it to obtain the software with the extension .fusion-update.
- 2 Click the icon on the Micro GC Fusion main page.
- 3 Click the System Administration button.



4 Click the **Update Software** button.



- **5** Micro GC Fusion will display the currently loaded software version.
- 6 Click the Choose File button and choose the software update file.
- 7 Click the Apply Software Update and Reboot button to complete the software update. The instrument will reboot after the software update and may be temporarily unavailable. Refresh the web browser 1-2 minutes after the system reboot to reconnect with the instrument.



8 The **On/Standby** button on the instrument front panel will be temporarily disabled during the system reboot. This prevents unintended instrument shutdown in the software update process.



A CAUTION

Do not shutdown or disconnect power from the instrument when a software upgrade is in progress. Doing so may result in an incomplete upgrade and potential data corruption.

10.4 GC Module Replacement

Each Micro GC Fusion GC module contains the analytical components required to perform a GC analysis. This includes an injector, column and detector. GC modules can be easily replaced for maintenance or to configure Micro GC Fusion for different applications.

For Micro GC Fusion instruments built after October 2019 and contain a JP-100, see Removal of the JP-100 [> 280] for instructions on how to remove the JP-100 before module replacement.

For Micro GC Fusion instruments built before October 2019 and do not contain a JP-100, proceed to GC Module Removal Procedure for 2-Module System [> 289] or GC Module Removal Procedure for 4-Module System [> 298].



⚠ CAUTION

Only technically qualified personnel should perform the procedures and maintenance described in this manual.

10.4.1 List of Required Tools

- open-ended wrenches, 1/4 in. and 5/16 in.
- 2.5 mm ball point L-handle hex driver (PN 070-1999)
- 2.0 mm hex wrench (4-module only)
- 2.5 mm hex wrench (4-module JP-100 removal only)
- · Phillips screwdriver

10.4.2 Removal of the JP-100

For instruments built after October 2019, the JP-100 must be removed prior to module removal or replacement. Follow the steps below then continue to GC Module Removal Procedure for 2-Module System [289] or GC Module Removal Procedure for 4-Module System [298].

10.4.2.1 2-Module JP-100 Removal

- 1 Shutdown the system by following the system shutdown procedure in Shutdown Procedure [273].
- **2** Remove all external electrical cables, including power cable and Ethernet cable.



⚠ WARNING

The Micro GC Fusion power cable must be disconnected before JP-100 removal operation to prevent potential electrical damage to the instrument.

3 Disconnect sample gas connection(s), carrier gas connections and venting connections.



A CAUTION

Sample gas and carrier gas must be properly disconnected before the JP-100 to prevent instrument damage from pressurized gases.

4 Set Micro GC Fusion on its left side as shown.




5 Remove the bottom eight screws with the 2.5 mm ball point hex driver.



6 Turn Micro GC Fusion back to its upright position. With finger tips, grasp the bottom lips of the housing on both sides, carefully pull them apart and lift the housing off Micro GC Fusion.



7 Disconnect the fan cable from the cable extension.



8 Remove the retaining screw holding the JP-100 in place with the 2.5 mm ball point hex driver.



9 Slide the JP-100 up and out of the instrument.



10 See GC Module Removal Procedure for 2-Module System [▶ 289] to continue the module removal process.

10.4.2.2 4-Module JP-100 Removal

- 1 Shutdown the system by following the system shutdown procedure in Shutdown Procedure [> 273].
- **2** Remove all external electrical cables, including power cable and Ethernet cable.

The Micro GC Fusion power cable must be disconnected before JP-100 removal operation to prevent potential electrical damage to the instrument.

3 Disconnect sample gas connection(s), carrier gas connections and venting connections.



A CAUTION

Sample gas and carrier gas must be properly disconnected before the JP-100 to prevent instrument damage from pressurized gases.

4 Set Micro GC Fusion upright, and remove the screws, three on each side, as shown.




5 With a hand on either side, remove the top cover by pulling straight up.



- **6** Remove the two small air filters on the top at the front of the unit.
- **7** Remove the top foam by grasping one front corner and the opposite back corner, and pulling straight up.



8 Remove the foam by the right side of each module by pulling it straight up out of the unit.



9 The 4-module Micro GC Fusion contains two JP-100 units.




10 Disconnect the fan cable from the cable extension.






10.4.3 Replacing the JP-100

After modules have been replaced, replace the JP-100:



This procedure is for Micro GC Fusion models built before October 2019 and will not contain a JP-100.



If the lower module needs to be removed, the upper module must be removed first.

- 1 Shutdown the system by following the system shutdown procedure in Shutdown Procedure [▶ 273].
- **2** Remove all external electrical cables, including power cable and Ethernet cable.



MARNING

The Micro GC Fusion power cable must be disconnected before module removal operation to prevent potential electrical damage to the instrument.

3 Disconnect sample gas connection(s), carrier gas connections and venting connections.



↑ CAUTION

Sample gas and carrier gas must be properly disconnected before the module removal to prevent instrument damage from pressurized gases.

4 Set Micro GC Fusion on its left side as shown.



5 Remove the bottom eight screws with the 2.5 mm ball point hex driver.



6 Turn Micro GC Fusion back to its upright position. With finger tips, grasp the bottom lips of the housing on both sides, carefully pull them apart and lift the housing off Micro GC Fusion.



7 Remove the side foam by pulling it sideways to free it from the dovetail joint at the bottom.





12 Using a 2.5 mm ball point hex driver, unscrew the two carrier gas manifold screws on the upper GC module.



13 Loosen and remove the venting connectors at the rear of the GC module by turning counterclockwise.

15 Repeat the same procedure (steps 9-14) to remove the lower module, if necessary.

10.4.5 GC Module Replacement Procedure for 2-Module System

This section illustrates the replacement of the upper module. If the lower GC module needs to be replaced, remove both upper and lower GC modules, and then replace the lower GC module, followed by the upper GC module.

- **1** Remove the GC module(s) by following the instructions in GC Module Removal Procedure for 2-Module System [▶ 289].
- 2 Position the replacement module into the chassis.
- **3** Connect the venting connectors at the rear of the replacement module. Rotate them clockwise until finger-tight.



4 Use a 2.5 mm ball point hex driver to replace the two carrier gas manifold screws onto the GC module. Tighten them until they are snug.





A CAUTION

Do not over-tighten the screws to avoid O-ring damage.

5 Insert the replacement GC module into the module slot by aligning the guiding pins and the 100 pin connectors on the GC module controller board and the GC module interface board.









- **16** Connect the sample gas connection(s), carrier gas connections and venting connections.
- 17 Connect the external electrical cables, including the power cable and the Ethernet cable.
- 18 Power up the instrument by pressing the **On/Standby** button on the front panel.

Micro GC Fusion automatically recognizes the new or replacement module configuration when it is turned on. The GC module configuration is stored in the EEPROM located on the GC module interface circuit board.

10.4.6 GC Module Removal Procedure for 4-Module System

This procedure is for Micro GC Fusion models built before October 2019.

If the lower module on for either side needs to be removed, the upper module on the respective side must be removed first.

- Shutdown the system by following the system shutdown procedure in Shutdown Procedure [▶ 273].
- 2 Remove all external electrical cables, including power cable and Ethernet cable.



MARNING

The Micro GC Fusion power cable must be disconnected before module removal operation to prevent potential electrical damage to the instrument.

3 Disconnect sample gas connection(s), carrier gas connections and venting connections.



⚠ CAUTION

Sample gas and carrier gas must be properly disconnected before the module removal to prevent instrument damage from pressurized gases.

4 Set Micro GC Fusion upright, and remove the three on each side.



5 With a hand on either side, remove the top cover by pulling straight up.



- 6 Remove the two small air filters on the top at the front of the unit.
- **7** Remove the top foam by grasping one front corner and the opposite back corner, and pulling straight up.



8 Remove the foam by the right side of each module by pulling it straight up out of the unit.



- **3** Connect the venting connectors at the rear of the replacement module. Rotate them clockwise until finger tight.



4 Use a 2.5 mm ballpoint hex driver to replace the two carrier gas manifold screws onto the GC module until snug.

Do not over tighten the screws to avoid O-ring damage.

5 Insert the replacement GC module into the module slot by aligning the guiding pins and the 100 pin connectors on the GC module controller board and the GC module interface board.





A CAUTION

Make sure that the column module is inserted using the guiding pins and that the connector is not damaged during installation.

6 Ensure the 100 pin connectors on the GC module controller board and the GC module interface board are securely connected.



7 From the left side of the chassis frame, use a Phillips head screwdriver to tighten the two captive screws to secure the GC module in place.





A CAUTION

Do not over tighten the screws to avoid module damage.

8 Connect the sample line to the GC module injector manifold. Finger tighten the connection and then use a 5/16 in. open end wrench to tighten it 1/4-turn past finger tight.





A CAUTION

Overtightening the sample line nut may damage the thread on the GC module.



15 Use a 2.5 mm ball-point hex driver replace the screws, three on each side.



16 Return Micro GC Fusion to the upright position.

17 Connect the sample gas connection(s), carrier gas connections and venting connections.

- **18** Connect the external electrical cables, including the power cable and Ethernet cable.
- **19** Power up the instrument by pressing the On/Standby button on the front panel. Ensure the modules heat to ready status.

Micro GC Fusion automatically recognizes the new or replacement module configuration when it is powered up. GC module configuration is stored in the EEPROM located on the GC module interface circuit board.


10.5.1 Replacing the External 10 Micron Sample Inlet Filter Disk

- 1 Shut off sample flow to Micro GC Fusion.
- 2 Reduce the temperature of the sample inlet by loading a method that has low inlet temperature (below 60°C).
- 3 Wait for the Micro GC Fusion sample inlet to cool.
- **4** If applicable, disconnect the sample line to the Micro GC Fusion input fitting using the 5/16 in. wrench, while holding the sample inlet filter with a 7/16 in. wrench.
- 5 Separate Part A and Part B by using two 7/16 in. wrenches, one holding Part A steady and another to loosen Part B counterclockwise.



- 6 Remove and discard the used filter disk from Part A.
- 7 Insert a new filter disk (PN 5183-4652) into Part A. Avoid handling the replacement filters. Wear laboratory gloves when performing this procedure.
- **8** Reassemble the sample inlet filter by using two 7/16 in. wrenches, with one holding the Part A steady and another to tighten Part B clockwise.
- **9** Place the dual-ended ferrule inside Part A. Connect the sample inlet filter to the sample inlet. Turn Part A clockwise until finger tight, then use a 7/16 in. wrench to tighten an additional 1/4 turn.



A CAUTION

Do not over tighten the sample inlet filter assembly to Micro GC Fusion. This will damage the dual-ended ferrule.

10 Finger tighten the sample line to the male portion of filter Part B and then use a 5/16 in. wrench to tighten an additional 1/4 turn, while stabilizing the sample inlet filter assembly Part B using a 7/16 in. wrench.

10.5.2 Replacing the Integrated Sample Conditioner Filter

- 1 Shutdown the system by following the system shutdown procedure in Shutdown Procedure [> 273].
- **2** Remove all the external electrical cables, including the power cable and Ethernet cable.
- **3** Disconnect the sample gas connection(s), carrier gas connections and venting connections.
- **4** Set Micro GC Fusion on its left side. The integrated sample conditioner filter (PN 059-0682) is accessed from the bottom of the Micro GC Fusion as shown.



5 Using a 3/16 in. Allen wrench, remove the hex plug that covers the filter from the unit.







6 Use forceps to remove the used filter from the unit.



7 Use forceps to place a new filter into the unit. Ensure the flat side of the filter faces the forceps.



8 Replace the hex plug.



9 Reconnect the external electrical cables, including the power cable and Ethernet cable, sample gas connection(s), carrier gas connection(s) and venting connections.

10 Micro GC Fusion is now ready to use.

10.6 External Sample Conditioner

10.6.1 Replacing the Internal Filter on the External Sample Conditioner

To replace the filter (part of PN 952-019-G1S):

- 1 Remove the power cord from the Micro GC Fusion external sample conditioner.
- 2 Ensure the handle is in the vent position and disconnect any sample line(s).
- 3 Let the device cool for a minimum of 20 minutes.
- 4 Unscrew the thumb screw on the side of the device.



5 Lower the filter door (PN 952-515-PIS).



6 Using a 1 in. open-ended wrench, loosen the bonnet nut (PN 059-0809S) counter-clockwise.




7 Remove the bonnet nut.





The filter assembly nut is tightened 1/8 turn past finger-tight for high pressure applications.

8 Remove the filter.



9 Replace the 7 μ m filter ensuring the **7** is facing outward.



- **10** Re-install the bonnet nut and hand-tighten.
- 11 Using a 1 in. open-ended wrench, tighten 1/8 of a turn past finger-tight.



12 Cover the bonnet nut by reattaching the cover door using the thumb screw on the side of the device.



13 Reattach the power cord to the external sample conditioner.



10.6.2 Replacing the Gasket on the External Sample Conditioner

To replace the gasket (part of 952-019-G1S):

- 1 Remove the power cord from the Micro GC Fusion external sample conditioner.
- 2 Ensure the handle is in the vent position and disconnect any sample line(s).
- 3 Let the device cool for a minimum of 20 minutes.
- 4 Unscrew the thumb screw on the side of the device.



5 Lower the filter door (PN 952-515-P1S).



6 Using a 1 in. open-ended wrench, loosen the bonnet nut (PN 059-0809S) counter-clockwise.







11.2 Common Chromatographic and Method Problems

This section provides additional information to help diagnose common operational problems. It is divided into two topics:

- 1 Chromatographic Problems
- 2 Method Problems

If the issue is not resolved after taking the suggested measure(s), contact INFICON.

11.2.1 Chromatographic Problems

Unexpected chromatographic behavior may be the result of:

- · Electronic or mechanical failure
- · Contaminants in gas lines, injectors, columns, and detectors
- · Incorrect or inappropriate set points
- · Leaks, bleed, or other chromatographic difficulties

These conditions often interact. For example, baseline problems may arise from any combination of the conditions. Accordingly, this section is organized by symptoms with reference to the most probable causes.

11 | Troubleshooting INFICON

11.2.1.1 Baseline Symptoms

11.2.1.1.1 Baseline Position

Baseline position changes suddenly during a run. This can result from:

- · Detector filament failure
- · Valve failure
- · EPC failure

Inspect the main page or **System Status** for error messages or faults. Power off Micro GC Fusion, restart and reload the method.

11.2.1.1.2 Baseline Wander and Drift

Baseline wander or drift is to be expected when a temperature setting is changed. With sufficient time, the problem should subside. The following cases assume that sufficient stabilization time has elapsed.

Running Micro GC Fusion in isothermal mode will help determine if there is a problem with the baseline or if the baseline effects are due to the temperature ramp of the column.

Baseline is erratic; moves up and down (wander):

- · Potential column leak
- · Change the sample conditioner filter
- If there is a leak at the detector end of the column, the retention times will be stable from run to run, but sensitivity will be reduced
- If there is a leak at the inlet end of the column, there will be reduced flow through the column, an increase in retention time, and reduced sensitivity. If a leak is suspected, contact INFICON.

Baseline moves steadily (drift) upscale or downscale during a run. This problem can be minimized by:

- Conditioning the column
- · Operating at a lower temperature
- Substituting an identical or chromatographically equivalent module

11.2.1.1.3 Baseline Noise

Noise is a continuous rapid baseline fluctuation, broadening the baseline and giving a grass like appearance. Noise is different than spiking. Spikes are isolated rather than continuous events. Some noise is inevitable with any detector.

Noise that appears suddenly on a previously clean baseline may be due to:

· Recent changes made to the system

- · Loose connections in the detector or its signal path
- · Detector contamination
- · Contaminated carrier gas

If the carrier gas tank was recently replaced, re-connect the previous tank to see if the noise decreases. If the new carrier gas is contaminated such that it saturates a trap, changing to the old tank may show little improvement until the traps are replaced or regenerated. This problem is most common with nitrogen carrier gas.

Noise gradually increases to an unacceptable level.

 This symptom indicates gradual buildup of the noise source, rather than an abrupt change as described above. If the cause of the noise is not found, contact INFICON.

11.2.1.1.4 Baseline Spiking

Spikes are isolated baseline disturbances and usually appear as sudden large upscale movements. If these spikes are accompanied by noise, address the noise problem first, as this may correct the spiking issue as well.

If spikes appear when a run is in progress, the cause is almost always electronic in origin.

Loose connections are often the most likely cause of spikes. Check all accessible cable connections.

External interference from local radio transmission equipment can also cause baseline spiking.

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11.2.1.2 Retention Time Symptoms

11.2.1.2.1 Retention Time Drift

Retention time drift is a steady increase or decrease of retention times in a series of successive runs.

Erratic retention times are discussed in Retention Time Wander (Reproducibility) [> 330].

If a backflush injector is configured, verify that the **Backflush Time** set point is optimized for that GC module. If the **Backflush Time** is set improperly, undesired components can enter the column, resulting in retention time drift.

Retention times suddenly increase significantly due to:

- Decreased carrier flow or reduced column temperature. In the System Status window, ensure the actual pressures and temperatures match their set points
- Low carrier gas pressure. The carrier gas tank may be empty. Replace if necessary

Retention time suddenly decreased significantly due to:

 Increased carrier flow or increased column temperature. In the System Status window, ensure the actual pressures and temperatures match their set points

If the actual pressures and temperatures do not match the set points, power Micro GC Fusion off, restart, and download the method again. If this does not solve the problem, contact INFICON.

11.2.1.2.2 Retention Time Wander (Reproducibility)

Reproducibility is erratic for successive runs of similar composition.

• Temperature or pressure variations within the run may be the cause. This may indicate possible heater or pressure control failure

Reproducibility is acceptable later in the run but not for early eluting peaks.

- When the earliest peaks elute very rapidly, they may not achieve chromatographic equilibrium with the stationary phase. They act as solvent peaks and are carried straight through the column
- If peaks were separated, but are no longer baseline resolved, lower the column temperature to achieve better separation

Retention time changes with large sample concentrations.

• When there is more sample than the column can handle, peaks will be deformed and will shift to earlier retention times. Reduce the **Inject (ms)** time.

11.2.1.3 Peak Symptoms

11.2.1.3.1 No Peaks

No peaks are typically due to insufficient **Sample Pump Time**, low detector sensitivity, or a short **Inject (ms)** time.

Verify if there is flow present by connecting a flow meter to the reference and analytical vents on the back of each module. No flow could indicate a broken column. The presence of flow could indicate an injector or TCD malfunction. Contact INFICON.

11.2.1.3.2 Inverted Peaks

Inverted peaks are usually caused by poor quality carrier gas. The carrier gas must be 99.995% to 99.995% pure. Inverted peaks often indicate that the carrier gas is contaminated, or that the incorrect carrier gas is being used or configured.

Carrier gas configuration can be checked on Micro GC Fusion through the System Status window. Refer to Carrier Gas Requirement [• 61] to change the carrier gas.

11.2.1.3.3 Extra Peaks

Extra, or ghost peaks are peaks that appear during a blank or sample run. Ghost peaks appear even when no sample is injected (and are also found among the actual component peaks during a sample run).

Ghost peaks appear during a blank run when:

- The column has been heated and idle for an extended period of time
- Carrier gas and plumbing contain impurities such as oils, greases, or other materials
- There is a reaction of the stationary phase with trace levels of oxygen, water, and other materials in the carrier gas
- The inlet is contaminated. Residues in the inlet are volatilized or pyrolyzed and swept onto the head of the column
- The sample conditioner is contaminated. If the sample conditioner contains a filter, replace the filter
- There is sample carryover from a previous run

Additional peaks appear when:

- Sample is not pure. Run a blank sample (carrier gas only). If the peaks persist, they are not sample related
- Thermal degradation of one or more components occurs due to an overheated inlet. Reduce the Sample Inlet Heater Temperature

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
The run time is not adequate for all the sample compounds to elute. Compounds
carry over and appear as traveling broad peaks during subsequent runs. This can
be eliminated by increasing Column Temperature or increasing the sample Hold
Time. If applicable, adjust the Backflush Time until all sample components
appear during a run

11.2.1.3.4 Deformed Peaks

The ideal chromatography peak is a pure Gaussian shape, although some asymmetry is always present, particularly near the baseline. Some common types of deformed peaks are described below.

11.2.1.3.4.1 Peak Fronting

The peak rises normally, then drops sharply to the baseline.




Fronting is usually caused by column overload. Reduce the sample **Inject (ms)** time. If using a variable volume or fixed volume injector, do not reduce the **Inject (ms)** time to less than 15 ms to avoid repeatability issues.

Fronting could also result from two (or more) closely unresolved peaks. Decrease the column temperature by 30°C and repeat the analysis. If peaks separate at the lower temperature, the fronting was caused by unresolved peaks.

11.2.1.3.4.2 Peak Tailing

The peak rises sharply, then falls normally to baseline.




Tailing is usually caused by column overload. Reduce the sample **Inject (ms)** time. If using a variable volume or fixed volume injector, do not reduce the **Inject (ms)** time to less than 15 ms to avoid repeatability issues.

Tailing could also result from two (or more) closely unresolved peaks. Decrease the column temperature by 30°C and repeat the analysis. If peaks separate at the lower temperature, the tailing was caused by unresolved peaks.

Tailing can also be caused by a low **Sample Inlet Heater Temperature**. Increase the **Sample Inlet Heater Temperature** and repeat the analysis.

11.2.1.3.4.3 Deformed Peak Apex

Top (apex) of the peak is deformed or flat.




A deformed peak apex is usually caused by detector saturation. Reduce the sample **Inject (ms)** time. If using a variable volume or fixed volume injector, do not reduce the **Inject (ms)** time to less than 15 ms to avoid repeatability issues.

A deformed peak apex can also result from a detector **Sensitivity** set to **High**. Ensure that the **Sensitivity** is set to **Standard**. Sensitivity setting is not applicable for the FAST Enabled Micro GC Fusion.

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11.2.1.3.4.4 Split Peak Apex



Ensure that this is not a merged peak by conducting a run at a lower column temperature. If the peaks separate at the lower column temperature, the split peak is due to unresolved compounds.

Hydrogen peaks, analyzed with a thermal conductivity detector and helium carrier gas, often show a split peak apex. Reduce the **Inject (ms)** time until the split is resolved. If using a variable volume or fixed volume injector, do not reduce the **Inject (ms)** time to less than 15 ms to avoid repeatability issues.

11.2.2 Method Problems

This section describes how to troubleshoot a method and solve problems that arise from incorrect Micro GC Fusion parameter settings, wrong peak identification windows, and inappropriate peak detection parameters. These conditions cause an erroneous calculation of the mole percent composition of samples. Troubleshoot the method if the following symptoms are observed in the reports and chromatograms when running a calibration standard.

- Zero mole percent composition for components known to be present
- · Peaks are not being integrated, or are being integrated incorrectly
- · Unusually high or low mole percent composition
- Samples with unnormalized totals outside the 95 to 105% range

11.2.2.1 Correcting Instrument Parameter Settings - Adjusting Column Head Pressure

Column head pressure controls flow through the column, and directly affects the retention time of all peaks in the run.

1 Determine the retention time for the start of the first peak for all modules in the calibration standard.

2 Adjust column head pressure so that all peaks elute within method defined peak windows.

3 Save the method.

11.2.2.2 Correcting Instrument Parameter Settings - Recalibrating

Changes to Column Pressure, Column Temperature, Inject (ms) time, and Backflush Time (if applicable) may cause peak retention times to shift and peak areas to change. The retention times and associated peak windows will require adjustment. Therefore, the method should be recalibrated. Recalibrate Micro GC Fusion as instructed in Calibration [> 220].

If a Micro GC Fusion or GC module is delivered to INFICON without an RMA number, it will be held until the sender is contacted. This may delay servicing the equipment.

Prior to being given an RMA number, a Service Request form must be filled out and submitted. The Service Request form is available under http://service.inficon.com.
